Best Tray Rules

see Class 1, BEST TRAY

Sponsored By HUMBER BRIDGE GARDEN CENTRE

- 1 The Best Tray Class is for a collection of 5 kinds of vegetables, 1 of each kind.
- 2 All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed either on a table or on a tray.
- 3 A tray, or board, measuring 45cm x 60cm (18" x 24") can be used to display the vegetables.
- 4 A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing but **NO** other foliage or accessories such as plates, sand, rings etc, will be allowed. Onion top may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.

Notes for Exhibitors & Judges

- Carrots & parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 15cm/6" (max).
- Peas & beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.
- Tomatoes must be displayed with calyxes (the green flower bud case).
- Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc, to check for quality.
- The tray, board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way at all such as cutting holes for standing onions in.
- Judges should use their discretion when judging the Best Tray Class remembering that entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors.
- The points awarded should be clearly marked by the Judges on the exhibitors' cards.
- Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to and decided by the Show Officials.
- Prize money may be collected from 4.00 pm [with white official slip](#).

Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification.

HINTS/TIPS ON SHOWING

These come mainly from comments from the judges in previous years.

When selecting the vegetables to show, try to get examples as similar as possible, e.g., 6 peas with full pods the same length. (Hold the pod up to a strong light to check the size and number of peas inside.)

- 1 Onions as grown means – leave the washed roots on as well as the top leaves.
- 2 Onions dressed means – cut off the roots and leafy tops, remove the dry leaves of skin and wind twine or raffia around the tops (plenty of YouTube videos to show how this is done).
- 3 Display dressed onions so that they stand on the table – curtain pole rings are good for this.
- 4 Groups of other vegetables and fruit can be displayed on a paper plate. You have to provide your own.
- 5 Tomatoes – make sure they have the stalk (calyx) still attached to prove they are home grown.
- 6 Runner beans should have a bit of stalk attached.
- 7 Lettuces may be displayed in a bowl of water to prevent wilting.
- 8 When you show more than one vegetable, fruit or flower in a class they should be as similar as possible.
- 9 Flowers – make sure the vase you use is clean and free from water marks.
- 10 Don't put cream in your Victoria Sandwich Cake.

- 11 Cabbages – Class 3. To remove all 'livestock' from cabbages, Dip in salt water the night before.

Best Vase Rules

See Class 50, BEST VASE.

The Best Vase Class is for a vase of mixed flowering stems containing between 5 and 10, taken from a minimum of 2 different kinds of plants. Please note that it is two different KINDS of plant, two varieties of the same plant are NOT two kinds.

- 1 The display is judged out of a total of 35 points, split into : 25 points for colour, form, condition, quality & freshness of the flowers on display and 10 points for the overall presentation & effect of the flowers in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be to the normal rules used for other classes.
- 2 Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only, no seed heads or berries will be allowed.
- 3 The vase can be any shape and size and made from any material but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.
- 4 No accessories such as bows and additional foliage will be allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flowering stem and still attached to that stem is allowed. Florists Foam is not allowed. Use chicken wire, flower frog, pebbles, marbles, compact moss or even fruit to support arrangements.

Notes for Exhibitors & Judges

- Flowering stems can be taken from any flowering plant.
- **The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera, for instance: Pinks, Carnations & Sweet William are all Dianthus therefore would not be classed as different kinds.**
- Use only fresh, home-grown flowers. No dried or silk flowers allowed.
- A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.
- The Best Vase Class is open for anyone to enter and is not intended purely for growers who regularly display in single species classes at shows.
- Judges should use their discretion when judging the Top Vase Class, bearing in mind that the entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors.
- Please note that the display has to be viewed all round.
- The points awarded should be clearly marked by the Judges on the exhibitors' cards.
- Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above Rules, should be referred to and decided by the Show Officials.

Failure to abide by any of these Rules will lead to disqualification.

Rules for Exhibitors

- 1 Class Entry Forms must be completed by the exhibitor.
- 2 Maximum of 2 entries per class per exhibitor.
- 3 **Maximum of 25 entries in total across all sections per exhibitor.**
- 4 Joint plot holders may enter up to 25 each, but their scores will not be combined to determine the plot holder with most points.
- 5 All plates, vases, etc to be provided by exhibitors.
- 6 All classes open to amateurs only.
- 7 Every precaution will be taken to protect exhibits, but the Committee takes no responsibility for loss or damage.
- 8 All entries must have been grown by exhibitors or have been in their possession for at least 2 months and NOT EXHIBITED before.
- 9 The Judges have the right to withhold awards at their discretion.
- 10 If any dispute shall arise, notice must be given in writing to the Secretary by 3pm with a deposit of £1. This will be forfeited if objections over-ruled.
- 11 Exhibits must remain in place until the awards have been presented.
